### MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Executive Board (Algeo, Bailey, D. Barnhart, Guralnik, Landau, McDavid and Milic) met on May 24, 1993, at 8:00 a.m.

The Secretary-Treasurer reported that the current number of members was 649, two-thirds in the United States, the remainder in Europe and Asia, for the most part. He pointed out that some members were derelict in their payment of dues, sometimes for several years, and requested the formulation of a policy on deliquency. The Board decided that members in arrears for the current and one previous year should be dropped from membership and instructed the Secretary-Treasurer to implement this policy.

The financial report for the biennium and the budget for the next year were accepted. The application for 501(c)3 status is still under consideration at the Internal Revenue Service.

With respect to the next meeting (1995), two offers, from two different members at the University of Georgia (Athens) were received. The Board expects that other offers may be made and a determination will be discussed at an early date.

The DARE staff has put forward a tentative offer to host the 1997 meeting at its home institution, the University of Wisconsin, in Madison.

In other business, the Secretary-Treasurer announced that he is preparing a Handbook for new members (incorporating the Membership Directory) and requested comments on a draft from members of the Board.

Sidney Landau suggested that the Society keep a register of lexicographers who would be interested in receiving news of openings at dictionary offices. (A service of this kind was announced by EURALEX in *IJL*, 6, 2.)

Roger Steiner (who could not attend) requested clarification of a question that had troubled him: may authors of articles that have appeared in *Dictionaries* be reproduced for class use or other non-profit use without the Society's permission? It was decided that no bar existed to such reprinting.

The Executive Board for the next biennium will consist of Sidney Landau (President, DSNA), John Algeo (Vice-President), Virginia McDavid (Immediate Past President), Richard Bailey, David Barnhart, Frank Abate and Joan Hall (members-at-large), and Louis Milic (Secretary-Treasurer).

Frederick C. Mish has been named Vice President and Editor in Chief for Merriam-Webster's dictionary publishing program, with responsibility for the Unabridged and the Collegiate dictionaries and "for designing and creating new editions of these two important and respected dictionaries..."

Morton Benson reports that Cambridge University Press has published the third edition of his *Dictionary of Russian Personal Names*. The new edition uses material placed at his disposal by members of the Russian Language Institute of the Academy of Sciences in Moscow.

Frank Abate has launched Dictionary & Reference Specialists, a firm offering "comprehensive services for the creation and revision of dictionaries and other reference works" at Old Saybrook CT.

D. J. van Schalkwyk announces the publication of Lexikos2, an installment in the AFRILEX Series from the Bureau of the Woordeboek van die Afrikaanse Taal.




